Despite government laws and programs these lives still lack anything predictable - and so their expectations and hope diminish. Yet - as with chaos lurking to disrupt order, there is also order waiting to present itself within the unpredictable life.

At Holiday Home Camp we introduce the wonders and rejuvenation of nature's finest elements - fresh air, warm sun, cool earth and clear water as the order, inspiration and balance that many of our young campers lack in their otherwise unpredictable and difficult lives. While we can't predict weather, we can be certain that nature can boost the spirits and drive of every one of us. And we can attest from 132 years of experience, that the disadvantaged children that we serve, soak these elements up like sponges introduced to water for the first time!

The nurturing embrace of supportive staff, the comfort of three delicious meals a day, the coziness of a warm bed with the crickets chirping outside the cabin window and the exhilaration of participating in so many fun activities amongst the tall, swaying trees of our beautiful lakeside property - all contribute to counter-act the hardship and challenges these children face back at home. Holiday Home Camp is that small circle of order and hope within their orb of chaos and the unknown. And once they realize that this potential exists within their world, we help them to seek it out - by coming back every year to Holiday Home Camp, and then joining our year-round ELITE leadership program - and perhaps by eventually becoming a camp counselor - as many of our recent campers have done over the years.

We are all constantly seeking balance and growth in our lives. Many of us come to Lake Geneva and other similarly inspiring places exactly for that reason - because the surroundings and the friendships we have made here are a counter-point to our busy and hectic lives. The children of Holiday Home Camp are no different.

Holiday Home Camp has been a symbol of balance to thousands and thousands of lives for generations and we are working hard to earn your continued dedication to that principle and interconnectedness that we all share.

Where did the summer of 2019 go?! It's already the end of September and Christmas is just around the corner. Registration for camp started on December 1st, 2018 and we had 711 campers who spent a part of their summer at camp. This is the 2nd year in a row that we have had over 700 campers attending camp!

In order to get kids to camp successfully, the registrar team work with a number of agencies including Illinois and Wisconsin Dept. of Health and Human Services. We also work alongside schools, churches, community centers and a variety of non-profit and child-focused organizations. This year we have expanded our reach to the schools of Racine, Waukegan and Woodstock. We also continue

to strengthen our grant relationships with Camp 4 Kids, Scope and Title XX who directly fund kids for camp. We had campers from 69 cities in Illinois and 41 cities in Wisconsin. We had campers revisit from Arizona, Indiana, Kentucky, Ohio and Texas. We even had a camper who traveled 4,790 miles from Szczebreszyn, Poland because her cousins spoke so highly about their camp! They spoke with such passion that she had to come and experience it for herself! She had a fabulous time and plans on coming back again in the future.

At the end of September Linda will be retiring as our full-time Registrar and passing the torch to Adriana who is eager to carry on the high stand-

ards and expectations of the registrar dept. Linda has happily agreed to stick around and help HHC when we need that extra support with a part-time role here at camp.





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

Towards the beginning of summer, the Wisconsin School for the Deaf, based in Delevan, and the Wisconsin Center for the Blind in Janesville came to OWLS to learn more about teamwork and leadership. It was amazing to witness new communication techniques being integrated into an OWLS program. Our staff utilized interpreters, writing, and ASL to effectively communicate with the deaf participants, while using descriptive language and a helping hand for the blind participants.

Though One Step is not a new program, it certainly is a rewarding one. It is an organization designed to help children diagnosed with cancer find success, friendship, and answers. Though some had physical limitations, they were still able to take part in the various fun and educational activities that OWLS has to offer, such as our High Ropes course. OWLS also has been fortunate enough to offer safe, fun, and educational learning/challenge-seeking experiences for an organization created as a response to gun violence, such as Readi Chicago. New Eclipse Community Alliance (NECA), along with two other nonprofit organizations, also benefitted from a day and a half program to help build relationships between the diverse communities in Chicago.

The diversity of programs that we run at OWLS is vast in terms physical/mental capa-

bilities, age, race, financial means, etc. From January of this year to the end of September, OWLS has worked with 2,171 participants. With still a few months of our season left to go, we look forward in continuing to give customized programs based on goals and objectives to help individuals grow in
